



The Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling, Inc Joins Campaign to Raise Awareness About the Risks of Youth Gambling

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Green Bay, WI – The <u>Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling</u> (WCPG) today announced its commitment as a Non-Lottery participant of the 2022 Gift Responsibly Campaign, joining lotteries and community organizations across the country and around the world to raise awareness about the risks of buying lottery tickets for children. The campaign is organized by the <u>National Council on Problem Gambling</u> (NCPG) and the <u>International Center for Youth Gambling Problems and High-Risk Behaviors</u> at McGill University.

Research shows that the earlier a person's participation or even exposure to gambling is in childhood, the more likely they are to develop a gambling problem later in life. Gambling exposure during childhood is often through some kind of lottery product, given by an adult who is likely unaware of the associated risks.

The Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling encourages adults not to give lottery tickets to underage children/teens as holiday gifts — many problem gamblers report that they began gambling during childhood. "Problem gambling is a growing concern among adolescents. We feel it's important to let parents, grandparents and others know that lottery tickets are not a good gift choice for children", says Rose Blozinski, WCPG Executive Director.

The WCPG has signed on to the campaign as a Non-Lottery participant. During November and December WCPG will work to raise awareness about the risks of youth gambling by public service announcements, social media, in-person school presentations, video presentations, etc...

"Youth problem gambling has emerged as a significant and growing public health issue. We applaud the Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling's commitment to raising awareness about risks of youth gambling through the Gift Responsibly Campaign," said Keith Whyte, NCPG Executive Director. "Our message is a simple one: lottery tickets are never appropriate gifts for children."

The WCPG has been an affiliate of the NCPG since 1994. Rose Blozinski has served on the National Board two different terms. Each term for several years. WCPG staff served on several committees over the years. WCPG has hosted the National Conference in 2012. The WCPG works in unison with the NCPG to promote awareness of gambling disorders and responsible gambling.
