• Groups: Therapy, Recovery, Support and Fun

James Harrison, MS, CSAC, LPC, ICGC-II, BACC, Lifestance Health, Brookfield, WI

This workshop is designed to discuss and share the dynamics, composition, activities and facilitation of groups as a therapy tool. Topics to be discussed are: the purpose of groups, composition of groups, how to select group topics, group rules and ethics, and the mechanics of group presentation and facilitation.

In addition to discussion, workshop participants will have the opportunity and privilege to take on the roles of group facilitators and group members in actual group settings.

The session will continue, highlighting counseling techniques, strategies, and potential problems that may arise in group and how to handle and deal with these problems and issues. This will be a more in-depth approach to group presentations and facilitation.

Although Gamblers Anonymous and Gam-Anon have been helping gamblers and their families for over 65 years, they are not for everyone. Many people seeking self-help groups can be turned off by their spiritual content. There are now many new options that include: Smart Recovery, Bettors Anonymous, Celebrate Recovery, Recovery Dharma, Gamblersinrecovery.com, and others. Although most are spiritually based, there are secular options. This workshop will explore the similarities and differences of each program and how to help clients find a meeting suitable to their personal views.



• Gambling Behaviors and Challenges Among Incarcerated Individuals and Criminal Justice Populations

Andrew J. Schreier, ICS, CSAC, LPC, BACC, ICGC-II, Community Medical Services & New Life Resources, Inc., Menomonee Falls, WI

This presentation delves into the complex relationship between gambling and populations related to incarcerated individuals and those involved in the criminal justice system. Gambling addiction is a lesser-discussed issue within these populations, yet it significantly impacts both individuals and the institutions they interact with. Attendees will gain a deeper understanding of the prevalence and patterns of gambling within correctional settings, the psychological and social challenges it poses, and the interventions available to mitigate its impact. The session will also address the role of gambling in recidivism and rehabilitation efforts, highlighting opportunities for effective treatment and support.

• Managing Workplace Gambling: Effective Strategies for Organizations

 How We Speak Matters: Undoing Stigmatizing Language

How we speak about individuals is how we treat them. The use of language is vital when it comes to prevention, education, treatment, and recovery from those experiencing problems with substance use, mental health, gambling and other areas of need. The use of some language continues to be outdated, not based on clinical application, stigmatizing, and even harmful. Using these types of words can impact someone not seeking help, disengaging in services, discouraging progress, and feelings of humiliation and shame.
